


It's Hot In Here:

potential damage to your medications




Storage Guidelines

Most medications should be stored between 68-77°F, but some may have more specific storage requirements. You should always ask your pharmacist how to store your medication.

Traveling in Warm Weather?

Temperatures inside parked cars rise quickly on sunny days, and checked bags on airplanes aren't temperature-controlled. If your medication needs to stay in a car, or be checked on an airplane, talk with your pharmacist about the most appropriate storage method.



Mobile Medication

Make your medication mobile. Pack any medication in a separate bag, such as a purse or carry-on, so you can keep it with you when changing locations.

Following the tips outlined above will help...

Keep you and your family safe from the dangers of improper medication storage.

Consult your pharmacist before taking any medication that has crumbled or developed a change in color, shape, or consistency.



Contact your pharmacist

Your pharmacist will verify if you should replace the medication or if it's safe to use. Some pharmacies and insurance companies may replace the damaged medication for free, so ask about your replacement options.
